




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

From the Great Dividing Range in the east, to the Northern Territory border in the west, the Gulf Savannah covers 186,000 square kilometres. It features golden grasslands and savannah woodlands, historic mining towns and train journeys, abundant wildlife and world renowned wetlands, Aboriginal communities, remote cattle stations and diverse geological wonders.

Part of the attraction of this region is its remote and undeveloped character. This means some facilities and services may not be available in some parts of the region. These and other seasonal factors need to be considered when travelling. Check with local Visitor Information Centres for the latest conditions.



Australia's Adventure Drive

Cairns to Broome via Katherine traverses spectacular scenery, five World Heritage Areas and over 20 national parks. At 3699 kilometres it makes for repeat visits or an epic adventure across northern Australia. Shorter sections allow visitors to fly in and hire a vehicle from Cairns, Normanton or Darwin.

The Savannah Way's main route through Cairns, Mareeba, Ravenshoe, Mt Garnet, Mt Surprise, Georgetown, Croydon, Normanton and Karumba is sealed and suitable for caravan and two wheel drive touring. Side or alternate routes offer four wheel drive adventure. Roads from Normanton to Burketown and beyond are largely unsealed and recommended for four wheel drive and off road equipment.

Climate

DECEMBER TO MARCH is "The Wet" or "Green Season". The countryside is lush and the birdlife is prolific. There is frequent rainfall and relatively high temperatures and humidity. Everything is growing and renewing itself.

Road improvements have opened the region to visitors for most of this period between Cairns and Karumba. Check road conditions before travel with local Visitor Information Centres or Queensland Transport and Main Roads at www.131940.qld.gov.au / phone 13 19 40. Burke and Carpentaria Shire Councils provide daily Road Reports on Visitor Information Centre websites during the wet season. Wet roads and rising river systems can be dangerous and conditions can change rapidly with rainfall, especially at low level stream crossings.


APRIL TO OCTOBER is a time of daily sunshine and very little rain. The warm days are balanced with cool nights especially in July and August. The countryside turns golden. This is "The Dry" season and most popular time to travel on The Savannah Way.

NOVEMBER/DECEMBER - Storm activity begins before the monsoon season. The late "Dry" has bird concentrations at their peak around water until the waterholes are replenished, birdlife increases and the countryside turn green again.

Fuel

Most fuel outlets in the region don't open until 7 am or later and close

by 6pm, so if you intend to travel early in the morning it is advisable to obtain your fuel the day before. Auto (LP) gas is available at Forsayth, Georgetown and Cloncurry.

Mechanical Repairs

Garages are available in most of the larger towns. It is advisable to ensure that your vehicle is mechanically sound and that consideration is given to carrying basic spare parts for your vehicle. Please check road conditions prior to departure to ascertain suitability of your vehicle to handle the conditions.

Up to the minute road reports can be obtained from Visitor Information Centres, Police Stations and Shire offices in the region. Local people and travellers coming the opposite way can also be a great source of information, so don't forget to ask around for more up to date information.

Trucks and freight haulers use Channel 40 UHF which is useful for gaining the latest information on roads.



Outback Driving Tips

Driving on narrow sealed and unsealed roads will involve taking more care than normal and the following tips will assist you in having a safe and pleasant trip.

Some sealed roads are narrow and when passing oncoming vehicles, especially trucks, you should drop two wheels off the sealed section and onto the gravel shoulder when approaching the oncoming vehicle. By doing this and also slowing down, you will greatly reduce the chances of rocks damaging your car and windscreen. Some larger trucks, especially road trains, will expect you to move off the bitumen entirely as they are less manoeuvrable. Be aware of rough edges and drop-offs as you move off, and onto the bitumen edge. Take it gently and without swerving to avoid losing control of your vehicle. If further braking is necessary, light pedal pressure is required.

The condition of unsealed roads can change quickly in wet weather or where large numbers of road trains and cattle trucks use the road. Unsealed roads can be slippery and rough for some time even after the weather has cleared.

On dusty roads extreme caution is required as visibility can be seriously reduced. Maintain a speed and road position that would be expected of you by other drivers. Bulldust can also conceal deep potholes and ruts so a reduced speed is advisable.


If you are taking it slowly, please allow other vehicles, especially commercial transport, to pass you at the earliest opportunity.

Many outback roads are unfenced and wildlife and straying stock feed beside the road at sunset and sunrise to take advantage of the "green pick", the extra grass that grows from burning regrowth and water run-off of the road surface. Kangaroos in particular are unpredictable - if one does jump in front of you avoid the temptation to over-react. An animal is often less damaging to your vehicle and its occupants than a roll-over. Emus will often pace a vehicle, running alongside it, however when they begin to tire they may swerve across in front of the vehicle.

Night driving is generally ill-advised and is the time when most accidents involving livestock occur. Darker breeds of cattle are difficult to see even if standing in the middle of the road and your peripheral vision is significantly reduced.

Many Gulf roads run east-west and driving when the sun is low on the horizon makes clear vision impossible. If you are driving in a westerly direction, plan to reach your destination by 4pm and easterly departures should not be commenced until the rising sun has climbed well above the horizon. To assist the visibility of on-coming drivers who are travelling into a setting or rising sun, turn on your vehicle headlights.

The concentration required in outback driving can be very fatiguing and a 15 minute break at two hourly intervals is recommended. Have a walk, splash your face, stretch, talk to someone. Helpful passengers will keep you chatting on long drive stretches to stay alert and pass the time.

Medical

A comprehensive first aid kit is advisable. If you use any medication ensure that you bring a sufficient supply for the duration of your trip. Local hospitals cannot dispense private prescriptions. Karumba Pharmacy fill prescriptions while you wait with a pharmacist on duty. At all other clinics only emergency medical treatment can be provided.

Communications

Television and Radio

The region has ABC TV, Seven (NT), Imparja and SBS. Croydon has VAST free to air digital satellite television and two radio stations, ABC and KIKFM 88.0. Radio transmission can be difficult to receive during the middle of the day and depends on location. Radio 4KZ has installed a Southern Gulf Repeater station and broadcasts to Karumba and Normanton giving better radio reception to these areas. Rebel FM broadcasts through Karumba. Normanton and the North Western area.

Public Internet Access

Internet Access is improving all the time. Several sites have internet access available for a small charge. Contact the Visitor Information Centres in Georgetown, Croydon, Normanton, Karumba and Burketown and also Bedrock Village Caravan Park in Mount Surprise.

Don't be a Data Hog! Many small towns have very limited bandwidth. To help local schools, businesses, clinics and farmers to function, please do a few simple things: Turn devices off when you are not using them, or put phones on flight mode to stop automatic searches, refreshes and updates; don't have an illegal 3G booster - use only Telstra Mobile Smart Antenna / 4G Cel-Fi, NOT larger booster repeaters that are illegal (2 years/\$22,000 penalty); don't try to download large files such as TV shows or long videos.

Fossicking

Fossicking can be great fun and many travellers have picked up valuable gold nuggets and semi precious gems on their travels. Ask at Visitor Information Centres en route, Mount Surprise Gems or where you pick up your licence for some background information.

Fossicker's Licences can be issued by the offices below. A Fossicking Licence allows the holder to enter any Designated Fossicking Area in the state of Queensland without the need to notify any authority. Details are at www.dnrm.qld.gov.au or any office. The holder of a Fossicker's Licence must not enter occupied land or a mining tenure without the written permission of the landholder or tenure holder (or both). Rules for camping also vary from area to area.

Visiting a Cattle Station

Several cattle stations in the Gulf Savannah are now open to visitors. Here you can see life behind the scenes and understand what it takes to live on the land in North Queensland. Talk to the locals about their heritage and modern methods of sustainable grazing and see the expansive country they manage. Learn about the breeds and sample the local produce. Check in the regional sections of this Guide for opportunities to stay at, tour on or even fossick on cattle stations.

Fishing & Boating

Fishing is great fun and locals will help with advice regarding bait and the best spots (or maybe the second best spots!) to go. See www.savannahway.com.au for some suggested locations and more information.

Remember that saltwater crocodiles inhabit many of the Gulf Savannah's waterways, so stay back from the water's edge, avoid repetitive behaviour such as checking crab pots at the same time every day, and clean fish well away from the water. Anglers do not require a licence to fish recreationally in Queensland, except if fishing in some stocked impoundments, however there are some regulations to keep fish populations healthy.

Barramundi closed season applies to Gulf of Carpentaria and adjoining waterways Noon 7 October to Noon 1 February. East Coast from Noon 1 November to Noon 1 February. Does not apply to Croydon's Lake Belmore.

Barramundi size limits in the Gulf are 58cm minimum to 120 cm maximum with a limit of five fish per person in possession. For information contact the Queensland Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, phone 13 25 23 or visit www.daff.qld.gov.au

In Queensland, licences are required when operating boats powered by a motor of over 6hp that are capable of speeds in excess of 10 knots and have a planing or non-displacement hull. For information on licensing and registration phone 13 25 23 and they can connect you to the Weipa or Karumba Queensland Boating and Fisheries Patrol offices.

Bird Watching

The Gulf Savannah's beautiful bird life entices many visitors to develop an interest in identifying species, watching their behaviour and learning about their habitats. A pair of binoculars and Bird Field Guide are all you need to get started.

Keen bird watchers come from around the world to see iconic species here, particularly in the upland rainforests of the Tropical Tablelands near Cairns, Savannah country around Croydon and the Gulf shores around Karumba. Visit www.savannahway.com.au to download our free "Bird Watching in the Gulf Savannah" booklet and call into local Visitor Information Centres for bird lists and seasonal tips.

The Kennedy / Hann Highway

More travellers are heading north or south via the Flinders Shire as the Kennedy Developmental Road (also known as the Hann Highway) improves. Around 31.3 kilometres remains as unsealed gravel between the Lynd and Hughenden. This provides a great alternative route and will allow you to explore some real hidden gems, including Australia's Dinosaur Trail featuring the world-class fossils of Winton, Richmond and Hughenden.

The Flinders Shire has a population of under 2000 and changing bio-regions to observe on your journey that support cattle and sheep grazing. Look for arid upland areas and grassy plains.

Hughenden's Visitor Information Centre is the Flinders Discovery Centre, housing an amazing exhibition of dinosaur fossils from around the world and the local area. "Hughie", a seven metre Muttaburrasaurus skeletal replica, was cast from the bones of a 110 million year old dinosaur found in the Flinders Shire. You can also see the Porcupine Gorge Light and Sound Show, Shearing the Stragglers display and other fossil and gem collections. Be sure to pick up a local map to take in the town's points of interest including unique metal sculptures depicting dinosaurs designed and made by local artists. Take the Eco Walk on Flinders to see local plants and artwork. Mount Walker, 10km south of Hughenden, has wonderful outback sunsets.

Porcupine Gorge was carved by Porcupine Creek out of a basalt lava-flow. Sunset shows off the soft colours of the walls towering 150 metres over the water. Lookouts, bushwalks to a swimming hole and a National Park campsite make this a great spot for a couple of nights.

Blackbraes National Park is a great introduction to the volcanic landscapes further north. Undulating ranges here surround basalt outcrops, basalt plains and seasonal swamps. Picturesque ironbark woodlands support grey kangaroos, abundant birdlife and many other native animals. Camping including van sites and nice local walks. The nearby Moonstone Hill Resource Reserve is

one of several small scoria vents surrounded by flat lying basalt lavas. 'Moonstone' feldspar occurs here as crystals filling gas cavities in the lava and is characterized by a silvery-white to blue sheen called 'adularescence'.

The Lynd Junction is the intersection of the Kennedy Development Road and the Gregory Development Road. The nearest township is the nickel mining township of Greenvale en route to Charters Towers and Townsville.

The main route is sealed as you turn west to Undara and Mount Surprise. Further south an unsealed road heads west from Lyndhurst Station through Oak Park to Gilberton, and continues to Agate Creek and Cobbold Gorge. Another unsealed westward short cut runs from the Lynd Junction to Einasleigh, also accessing Georgetown and the Etheridge Shire.


The Matilda Way



Chillagoe

Chillagoe is on an Alternate Route of the Savannah Way and well worth a detour. The full 4WD Alternate Route runs from the Savannah Way near Mount Surprise along the Ootan Road following the Savannahlander tracks to Almaden, then on a remote loop to Normanton and Karumba, via Wrotham Park and Dunbar Stations. There are no visitor facilities on this loop so be self-sufficient and check road conditions.

A popular short cut to Chillagoe is from Mareeba via Dimbulah and Almaden on a mostly sealed road. This is a great way to link to the Ootan Road or just visit for a few days from your Tablelands base.


The highlight of Chillagoe is a visit to the stunning caves. Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service runs excellent guided tours daily through the spectacularly-lit Donna, Trezkinn and Royal Arch caves, full of hidden beauty. Tickets must be purchased in advance from The Hub in Chillagoe.

Visitors can also explore self-guided caves in the National Park. Please check with the ranger base and be well prepared. The Archways (220m / 30 mins / Easy) is a semi-open cave. Pompeii Cave (600m / 50mins / Difficult) is a cleft in the rock filled with large boulders, the remnants of a previous collapse. A short but steep climb to the bottom reveals a dark passage and some attractive formations. Bauhinia Cave (300m / 20mins / Difficult) is entered via a dark, narrow crevice requiring a steep scramble down large boulders to see cave coral. As in all caves please don't touch the formations, and bring a torch. Check out the caving adventure experiences offered by the local caving club for novices or more experienced cavers. Email: info@chillagoecavingclub.org.au.

The Chillagoe-Mungana Caves National Park offers many scenic walking opportunities. Drive 2.5km south to Balancing Rock and stop to view the expansive surrounding landscape on the 440 metre moderate difficulty track. The Balancing Rock track can also be accessed from the Donna Cave car park, 1.8km from Chillagoe, with a walk through open woodland. From Balancing Rock car park the Royal Arch track (9km / 2.5 hours / Easy) passes the Wullumba Aboriginal rock art site and winds past several striking limestone tower karsts to the Royal Arch bluff, an imposing jagged limestone outcrop rising abruptly from the surrounding woodland.



Look for local wildlife, from Rock Wallabies and bats to skinks and insects. Chillagoe is an interesting bird watching region, with over 75 species recorded. In town be sure to visit historic sites such as the Chillagoe Smelters, Police Museum and authentically restored Railway Station. Chillagoe has a selection of caravan parks and accommodation. River swimming is available close to town – ask the locals and stay safe.

Undara Volcanic National Park

Situated on the McBride Volcanic Province, the Undara Volcanic National Park is 40 km east of Mount Surprise. with evidence of volcanic activity from 164 craters. One of the most recent and major eruptions 190,000 years ago produced 23 cubic kilometres of lava, most of which flowed down the western side of the Great Divide. This flow created a geological phenomenon now known as the Undara Lava Tubes. The tubes acted as conduits distributing lava over 100 km from the crater, the longest flow in the world from a single volcano.

Access to the lava tubes is only through the Savannah Guides Enterprises Undara Experience (at the National Park) and Bedrock Village Caravan Park (in Mount Surprise, 55 kilometres).

At Undara Experience are some great walking and cycling tracks to the Kalkarni Crater Rim Walk, the Bluff Lookout and along the historic telegraph line towards Cardwell. The Wildlife at Sunset Tour is an incredible experience. watching thousands of insectivorous microbats emerge from a lava tube while being hunted by dangling snakes and swooping falcons.

Mount Surprise is a railway town on the old Cairns to Forsayth Railway line and is the first Gulf Savannah town encountered by visitors approaching from the east. It is the centre for gem fossicking with topaz, guartz, spinel, garnet, cairngorm and aquamarine to be found. Mount Surprise sits on the edge of the immense Undara lava field caused by ancient volcanic eruptions in the McBride The surrounding country is flat, wooded savannah grasslands with isolated hills.





Etheridge Shire

Georgetown

Situated west of the Newcastle Range on the Etheridge River, Georgetown is the administrative centre for the Etheridge Shire. A thriving gold hub at its peak in the 1870's, Georgetown was named in honour of the local gold commissioner Howard St George. The area still yields gold nuggets and semi-precious stones including topaz, quartz, spinel, garnet, cairngorm, aquamarine and sapphires. The area was known as "Poor Man's Goldfield" because gold nuggets could be picked up from the ground without expensive equipment. Today the town is also a service centre for local pastoralists and mining operations.

Stroll around this outback town to see the restored Shire Hall in St George Street, Savannah House, Masonic Temple, Catholic Church and the cemetery.


There is also a signed Georgetown River Walk featuring local bird life. The free public swimming pool is open all year round in daylight hours.

Considered the Heritage Capital of the Gulf, Croydon has a rich history which started with the discovery of Gold in 1885 and led to the development of a rich, booming gold mining town. In its heyday, it was the third largest town in northern Queensland and serviced a goldfield that extended for 18km and produced 23,675kg of gold over 35 years. Today Croydon still glows from the dust of its feverish gold-mining days while it sits on top of deep untapped gold reserves.

The Historic Gulflander Train travels to the award winning steel replica Croydon Station weekly on revolutionary, heritage listed steel sleepers. It overnights in Croydon on Wednesdays, and returns to Normanton the next day.

Every Thu night at 6pm from Apr-Sep, there is a threecourse dinner for \$10. The venue changes each week. Proceeds go to various Croydon charities.



Normanton

Established on the Norman River by William Landsborough, Normanton was the port for the Croydon gold rush in the 1800s. Today it is the major Government service centre in the Gulf Savannah with regular flights and a range of accommodation and activities.

The Normanton Railway Station is a classic example of Victorian architecture and a highlight among a range of preserved historic sites to visit in Normanton. The historic Burns Philp building which houses the Visitor Information Centre and Library should be your first stop to get all the info on what to see and do in Normanton. Pick up a selfguided tour map. Be sure to get your photo with Krys the Croc beside the Carpentaria Shire Council building. Krys is a staggering 8.63 metres long!

Fishing from the fishing bridge and wharf is a must while you are here. Explore the surrounds of Normanton including Burke and Wills last marked campsite 'Camp 119'. Muttonhole is a stunning wetlands that come alive from November to April as the monsoon rain replenishes

dry waterways and lakes that attract all varieties of birdlife such as brolgas, pelicans and jabirus. In the dry season the wetland retreat leaving a beautiful landscape of mangroves and grassland. Cameras are must in this area.



Karumba

At the mouth of the Norman River, Karumba is the centre of the Gulf's prawning, crabbing and barramundi fishing industries. This is a popular spot to camp or stay in some of the Savannah Way's most pleasant accommodation. Driving in from Normanton you'll pass through the Mutton Hole Wetlands, an internationally listed wetland habitat for birds. Extending inland for 30 kilometres, these meandering saltwater tidal estuaries are the habitat of saltwater crocodiles and many bird species including pelicans, brolgas and black swans.

Karumba is the only beach in the Gulf Savannah serviced by a sealed road so access is year round except for occasional flooding events during the wet season. Fishing is the most popular activity, with tours and excellent facilities for your own boat. Local shops sell all necessary gear and have plenty of tips for visitors.

The Karumba region is also interesting to explore, with many interpretive signs on streets and along walking paths, beach side 4WD tracks and cafes, shops and attractions to visit. Ask at the Visitor Information Centre for local tips.

Visit the iconic Les Wilson Barramundi Discovery Centre and discover the amazing secrets of the mighty Barramundi, the only hatchery in the world to breed the Southern Gulf strain of this iconic fish! 





Kowanyama

Kowanyama is an Aboriginal community located 40 kilometres from the coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria on the Mitchell River delta. Within the Kowanyama Trust Area there is a variety of landscapes including extensive marine Savannah grassland plains, dense dune woodlands and vine thickets, open eucalypt country and freshwater wetlands. The abundant wildlife is valued as a subsistence hunting resource by the community, and visitation must be low impact. The Aboriginal Ranger Service polices the Trust Area which is definitely a "no hunting area".

The tourist camping/fishing season commences on 1st June each year and ends at the closure of the barramundi season. Fishing sites are fully booked well in advance, so please enquire before entering the Trust Area. Under the Alcohol Management Plan applying to Kowanyama, alcohol may not be taken into the Trust Area. Heavy penalties apply.

ACCOMMODATION

Camping is at a limited number of unimproved campsite bush locations on both fresh and salt water sites. A camping fee is charged and regulations apply. Bookings should be made prior to arrival.







Burketown

Known as the Barramundi Capital of Australia, Burketown is on the Albert River 25km from the coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria with wetlands to the north and savannah grasslands (hailed by early explorers as the Plains of Promise) to the south. The Nicholson River, some 17 km to the west, delivers perennial fresh water to the wetlands which are breeding grounds for crocodiles, barramundi, prawns and birds.

The grasslands to the south provide habitat for an array of wildlife including kangaroos, emus and many seed eating birds. Burketown also has a rich Aboriginal history. Macassans from Sulawesi established semi-permanent settlements along the coastline and islands for 600 years prior to European discovery.

Established in 1859 it is the Gulf's oldest town. American Civil War veterans, Dutch East India Company traders and Native Mounted Police mingled in this pioneer outpost, and the Burketown to Normanton telegraph line competed with the Adelaide to Darwin line to connect Australia to Europe. "Gulf Fever" decimated the town and forced its evacuation in 1866 until re-establishment 18 months later.

THINGS TO DO AND SEE

Self Drive

South east of Burketown you'll see the Frederick Walker monument at the Leichhardt River crossing near the Floraville homestead. A natural campsite near the falls has some Aboriginal grinding slits in the river bed. There have been crocodile sightings around the river crossing above and below the falls.

The Burketown cemetery

Take a fascinating journey into the past as Burketown was the original Gulf settlement with very turbulent beginnings. The cemetery also gives a good indication of the devastation of "Gulf Fever" (thought to be typhoid). The historic remains of the original Gulf meatworks are on the Albert River just north of the town.

Photography fans will enjoy the stark salt flats and prolific

bird life.

Stroll along the unformed Albert River Drive at sunrise/ sunset to enjoy an array of mangrove birdlife. Visit the Artesian Bore, sunk to a depth of 722m in 1887 as the town's water supply but ultimately too mineral laden for this purpose. Now the steaming 68 degree water flow forms a wetland refuge for wildlife and photographer's favourite, especially in the early morning glow with its eerie mist. The Old Post Office, now the Visitor Centre was built in 1887 and is the oldest building in Burketown and the third oldest remaining building in the Gulf.

Adels Grove

Adels Grove is a 32 hectare freehold property completely surrounded by the 6,000 square kilometre Lawn Hill Station cattle property which is a Fauna and Flora Reserve. Around 1920 Adels Grove was taken up by Albert de Lestang, a French botanist. By 1939 he had some 1,000 species of exotic and native plants, shrubs and trees growing here.

Adels Grove is 10km from Boodiamulla National Park headquarters and is a great base for exploring the National Park and World Heritage Listed Riversleigh Fossil Fields. Adels Grove has unpowered camping/caravan sites, pre-erected tents, basic food supplies, laundry, bistro/bar, canoe hire, half day tours to Riversleigh Fossil Fields, emergency mechanical repairs and fuel.

Boodiamulla National Park

(Formerly Lawn Hill National Park)

This spectacular gorge system has sheer 60 metre sandstone walls and crystal clear green water which flows in abundance all year round. The lush tropical vegetation includes Livistona palms, Leichhardt trees, paperbarks, figs, pandanus, and white cedar trees - remnants of the ancient rainforest that covered the Gulf Savannah millions of years ago. The diverse wildlife includes agile wallabies, wallaroos, possums, insectivorous bats, olive python, water monitors, tortoises, and a variety of birdlife. The park also has two Aboriginal art viewing areas. 20km of marked pathways provide access to spectacular viewing areas around the gorge.

Facilties include camping area (20 sites) with toilets and cold showers. Visitors should be self sufficient in food, camping supplies and vehicle spare parts. Fires and generators, pets, motorboats and fishing are not permitted within the park. Bookings for Easter to October should be made online (fees apply) at www.nprsr.qld.gov.au.


Riversleigh Fossil Fields

The World Heritage Listed Riversleigh sections of the Boodiamulla National Park contain a famous fossil field of enormous significance. Here palaeontologists have discovered orders of creatures formerly unknown to science, doubling the sum of knowledge of Australia's prehistoric fauna.

Pale grey limestone, formed in spring-fed lakes and pools that once nourished a vast rainforest, now encase the fossilised remains of strange animals, birds, reptiles and plants from 15-25 million years ago. Tours to Riversleigh are available from Adels Grove.

Camping is permitted at Miyumba bush camp. Campers need to be totally self-sufficient and camping spots are limited.

Borroloola

The main destination and service centre for visitors, founded on the site of Ludwig Leichhardt's crossing of the McArthur River. This is a significant town with facilities associated with the nearby McArthur River mine, tapping one of the largest zinc bodies in the world. It is a favourite fishing destination for many travellers. Visit the Museum in the 1866 Police Station. At Borroloola the sealed road recommences which ultimately joins the Stuart Highway.

A local service centre, Borroloola provides mechanical services, a supermarket and government offices. You can base here for some great fishing including boat hire from the Savannah Way Motel.

King Ash Bay

40km downstream on the McArthur River from Borroloola, it offers mangrove lined waterways, and off shore island fishing. Fishing charters are available and the Fishing Club has a camping ground and Lodge accommodation. The Fishing Classic competition is held over the Easter weekend each year (weather and road access permitting).

Cape Crawford

Visit one of Australia's great geological wonders, the Lost City. These bizarre towering rock formations in the Abner Range formed through uneven sandstone weathering, creating an eerie landscape. Aboriginal people called the formations Yalyalacomella, with rock shapes representing the Rainbow Serpent's body and eggs in spiritual ceremonies. Helicopter access tours are available here as well as accommodation and camping at Heartbreak Hotel.

Driving to Mataranka (Unsealed Route)

More unsealed adventure lies from Cape Crawford through Roper Bar to Mataranka. This is remote 4WD country with some spectacular spots. As with many sections on the Savannah Way, plan your fuel stops with hundreds of kilometres between roadhouses. The road can be slow depending on how recently it was graded, so take it easy and look out for bulldust holes and sharp rocks.

Limmen National Park features numerous, large sandstone spires and rounded domes sometimes called "lost cities". The most accessible site is the Southern Lost City. 4km off the Nathan River road near Lorella Springs with camping facilities, toilet block and a 2.5km walking track. Nathan (Western) Lost City is 28km off the Nathan River road, is day visitation only and requires a key from Nathan River Ranger Station (Ph: (08) 8975 9940). Limmen National Park has several camparounds including the picturesque Butterfly Falls.

Lorella Springs Station is a popular remote hideaway with great camping. African style safari tents and cabins. Spend some days sampling the outstanding river and coastal fishing or fun 4WDing before soaking in the hot springs and finishing in the bar. Excellent safe swimming holes, bushwalks and friendly hosts. Fuel available.

Limmen River Fishing Camp has cabins, camping and a small general store (Ph: (08) 8975 9844). Traditional Owners do not allow access to Maria Lagoon.

You'll pass the St Vidgeons ruins, a homestead abandoned in 1974. Lomarium Lagoon is a nice photo stop but camping is not permitted.

Munbililla Campground, or Tomato Island, is a National Parks camparound with good facilities, boatramp and fish cleaning facilities (Phone: (08) 8975 9940). You'll get the Naukurr community's Telstra mobile reception here. Roper Bar is an historic settlement on the Roper River. Ludwig Leichhardt crossed the river in 1845 at Roper Bar, a rocky shelf at the river's high tide mark, naming it after John Roper from his expedition. The bar separates the salty, tidal waters and the fresh water upstream. Permits are not required for camping on the southern side of the river. Fishing access includes two boat ramps nearby and the banks downstream of the bar.

Be careful if crossing the bar. Locals advise that generally if the Red Rock river height is over 3 metres the Roper Bar crossing will be too high to drive over. Pass Police Station ruins on the left going down to the Bar to Leichhardt's Crossing memorial.

Please note that the Roper Bar Store is now closed, so there is no fuel, camping or accommodation available.

Visit the Naukurr Art Centre with gallery and workshop to meet artists for a day trip without a permit, but for longer visits in Arnhem Land contact the Northern Land Council on (08) 8920 5100 in advance for processing. Other local phone numbers are the Health Clinic (08) 8975 4688 and Ngukurr Police (08) 8975 4644.

Port Roper is simply a boat ramp with no facilities. Fishing from the banks is not advised.

Around 40km from Roper Bar it's sealed road to Mataranka on the Stuart Highway, Cattle station permission required for camping.



Mataranka

Jeannie Gunn's classic Australian novel "We of the Never Never" (1906) documents a pioneer woman's life here. Visit the cemetery, replica homestead and town memorabilia to imagine early settler life.

Relax at Bitter Springs, floating with the current along a crystal clear creek or visit the more established Mataranka Thermal Pools.

The Katherine Visitor Information Centre offers customised travel itineraries, tour and accommodation bookings and all the information there is on what to see and do in and around the Northern Territory region.

The Katherine Museum was the air terminal during World War II, and now contains eclectic artefacts, photographs, maps and pioneer memorabilia in informative displays. Chat to the friendly volunteers and visit the tea room. O'Keeffe House also give valuable insight into Katherine's past. Visit several authentic Aboriginal art galleries or make your own masterpiece at Top Didj Cultural Experience. Visit the School of the Air for a vital side of life today. Katherine River flows through town. Low Level Nature Reserve and Knotts Crossing are beautiful places, however not recommended for swimming. There is swimming in our crystal clear Katherine Hot Springs.

Nitmiluk (Katherine Gorge) National Park is the jewel of the region, a magnificent series of 13 gorges carved by the Katherine River. It is the home of the Jawoyn people who are deeply involved in the park today. The Park is 29km from Katherine on a fully sealed road and offers a variety of spectacular boat cruises; half day, full day or overnight canoeing, scenic flights and over 100km of bushwalking trails with something to suit all visitors. The Jatbula Trail is an iconic five day walk, covering 58km of bushland, that can be undertaken independently or on tour. The Nitmiluk Visitor Centre at the Gorge has interpretive displays and a café. Contact Nitmiluk Tours for more information on (08) 8971 0877.

Marksie's Stockcamp is award-winning and very unique. A dining under the stars Aussie Camp Tucker Dinner Experience. Tom Curtain's Show in the Katherine Outback Experience provides a taste of the Australian Outback right on the doorstep of town with real life horse-starting and working dog demonstrations, live music and humorous bush tales.

The Katherine Region

The Katherine Region is around the size of Victoria, so take a little time here. Cutta Cutta Caves Nature Park is via the Stuart Highway 30 km south of Katherine. Bushwalk or tour spectacular karst formations and complex cave networks. Daily guided tours are generally on the hour. Edith Falls, off the Stuart highway 46km north of Katherine, has walks and picturesque swimming holes for a day or camping.

Flora River Nature Park is 122km south west of Katherine on the Victoria Highway. Enjoy canoeing, fishing and boating (no swimming – saltwater crocs!) in a really scenic park.

The Douglas Daly area has swimming spots, gorges, fishing on the mighty Daly River and great camping spots. Katherine is a restocking point for many Kakadu and Arnhem Land travellers. Heading west on the Victoria Hwy to The Kimberley, magical scenery includes grand escarpments on the Victoria River and more National Parks for remote bushwalking, fishing and camping.
